He gains confidence to ask another islander if they are with him in the early morning. Jim escapes, When Miss Watson planned to trade him. Huck, Miss Watson's slave, promises not to betray him. Huck and Jim went to the Island and build a camp in a cave and waited for the storm to pass so that they can go on an adventure. They find a two-story wooden home, where an unknown man is discovered dead. Jim advises Huck to stay away, and they cover the body with rags. Huck and Jim returned to Island after the adventures to find the death as disguising as a woman. A newcomer informs him that initially, his father was blamed, but now they believe Jim was responsible due to his simultaneous disappearance. Jim's capture of Jackson Island brings a \$300 reward. Huck and Jim return to the Island, where they find a stuck steamer and encounter three criminals.
